In 2023 we celebrated 13 baptisms, 7 confirmations, 7 high school graduations, 10 students receiving first communion and more.

# DID YOU KNOW?

More than **50 volunteers** hosted over **300 visitors at our annual Welcome Neighbor Corn Feed.** This event brought the community together for an evening of **entertainment**, **kids' activities** and **food**.

Thanks to a generous donation, we switched the parking lot and sanctuary lights to LED. This switch will provide better lighting, longer lasting bulbs, and lower electrical bills.



The Care Ministry Team started a Prayer Shawl Ministry. These handmade shawls are given to those facing a life crisis. The first Prayer Shawl was given to **Renata Dahl**.



2023's **Bazaar and Cookie Walk** hosted **22 vendors** and sold about **300 dozen cookies and other baked goods**. Proceeds help support hospitality activities and the Youth Mission Trip.



During the summer, we hosted our first **Storytime**. We had guest readers **share stories** about God. It was followed by an activity and snack. It was a great time for everyone. Volunteers welcomed 50 students to this year's Twists & Turns VBS.

A yearly favorite for everyone. These students also collected donations for the Watertown-Mayer Royals Room and the Watertown Food Shelf.



Thanks to generous donations, we were able to add **automatic door openers** to our main entrance making it easier to get in the building.



Your gifts helped support over 12 local & global missions, including 95 boxes packed for Operation Christmas Child, 1,769 pounds of food and \$2,710 donated to Friends for Life, numerous layettes assembled for Orphan Grain Train, a quilt sewed for Carver County Veterans services & PLC graduates, 18 blessing bags assembled & given out to the homeless, and so much more. Remembering back to my first year at Peace, I recall going with a few members of the Ministry Board to an LCMC meeting (Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ) at a church in Hutchinson. Pastor Mark Vander Tuig from the LCMC was our keynote speaker. In his message, he asked the question, "Who does the church belong to?" He shared a number of thoughts about what some people in the congregation might think, what pastors might think, and then he concluded, "The Church belongs to God." When we get that mixed up in our thinking, we lose sight of who we are and what our mission is as followers of Jesus.

Because the audience had a good portion of pastors listening, he unfolded how we (pastors) can sometimes answer this question. Pastors can easily find themselves believing that the church belongs to them. We even hear it said occasionally, "Peace? Isn't that Pastor David's church?" For a whole lot of not-great reasons, we come to believe we are in charge. We are called by God to serve. We are called by the congregation to lead. Our past church experience and our theological training prepares us to direct the church. Pastors, like all human beings, are subject to sin - pride, ambition, selfishness and much more. Vander Tuig was quick to point out how that viewpoint will fail us as pastors and take us off course. The Church does not belong to the pastor. The Church belongs to God.

Recognizing our sinfulness is to place things in their proper order. The Church belongs to God. It is His church. Our mission is to share the good news (gospel) of Jesus with others. We do this, not inviting others to come to our church, but to, as we like to say at Peace, "Come and See what God is doing at Peace."

In this way, we understand God's purpose for the Church. The Church is always for the "other," for the "guest," the "outsider," "the one who doesn't belong," who hasn't served on a committee or given a nickel. In the ministry of small groups, there is a principle that a group will agree to: the principle is to set an empty chair in the circle or at the table. That empty chair is to remind us who God's church is for... it is for the one who will come because the Holy Spirit is calling them to come to His church. The one we will welcome and have a place for ... because we were once that person who needed to find God's Church. We, sinners all, looking for forgiveness, seeking redemption, look to the cross and the love of God in Jesus Christ.

In both cases, pastor or congregation, when we think we alone are right and know what to do, we have forgotten the fundamental understanding that the Church belongs to God. When we offer our prayers, sing our praises and give our gifts, we do so not to our church, but to God and the good work of God's people. To answer the question, "Who does the Church belong to?", the only answer can be "God."

# A MESSAGE FROM MARK NISSEN Director of Youth & Family Ministry

2023 was a fantastic year for youth ministry here at Peace! We have continued to see more and more new faces come in the door and have also seen some students really step up into leadership. I'm so proud of how our youth have grown as young men and women this year, and I look forward to 2024!

Confirmation is an awesome part of what is going on here at Peace. The program continues to grow, with 38 students this year. Most of this growth is due to new families. We had seven students confirm their faith in Christ in May. They are really an amazing group who have continued to stay plugged into our church and their faith! We have been working through the New Testament and its teachings. At the end of this year we will have written a threeyear curriculum that covers the Old Testament, the New Testament, and Luther's Small Catechism. Confirmation provides an important foundation for our students to help them understand what we believe and why we believe it.

Our trip this year to South Carolina was an excellent experience once again. We brought 24 youth and 4 adults to Columbia, SC for a week of service. While there, our students helped with construction projects, yard work, a local food shelf, and many other things. The beautiful parts of these trips come in the relationships that are made. Not only between students, but also the relationships that are formed with members of the community we serve. This year we were very impacted by the man in the middle of the top photo, who was working security at Pretty Place Chapel, a beautiful chapel in the mountains. He stopped us and talked to us about his experience of people coming to Jesus there and his ability to minister to people in need through his job. These trips always show us how Jesus is working in a way we don't expect, and He certainly was that this year. Next year we will be serving in Colorado Springs!

Another highlight of our year has been starting Sunday night Bible studies. This came out of the mission trip and students wanting time to dive deeper into scripture. This summer we started with gathering at my house for a meal then took time to talk through the minor prophets together. We made it through all of the minor prophets and have now moved to the book of Romans. This is an opportunity for students to take a deeper step in their faith while also sharing a meal together and growing in their relationships. I'm excited to see how this ministry will grow!

A very exciting thing happening in Watertown is seeing the area churches working together more and more. Bringing the Christian youth of Watertown together to share and grow

in their faith has been a wonderful thing. This year we have participated in Trick-or-Treat for the Food Shelf and See You at the Pole. We also held a unity gathering for all of our youth groups and planned other activities for our youth. Beyond that, the local FCA group has been a great addition, bringing students together to share their faith.

One other new experience we had this year was getting to go on an MEA retreat for our High School youth. We were joined by four other churches and their youth groups at Ingham Okoboji Bible Camp for two nights away. This was a fantastic

experience where we spent the weekend working through the book of Ephesians. It was a weekend full of worship, scripture, and just escaping the craziness of our everyday lives. It is certainly something we are looking forward to doing again. It was especially awesome to get to do this with other LCMC congregations and develop some great relationships with other churches and their youth.

It really has been a fantastic year here at Peace. I know my whole family is blessed to be a part of this church and the ministry here. We are so thankful for all the love that is shown to us and both of our daughters. It really means the world to us to see people hold Ellie and to hear people remember our precious Hadley. We so look forward to what the future holds at Peace, and are grateful to be part of this wonderful church family.

### **Proposed Peace Lutheran Church Constitution Revision**

The Ministry Board is proposing the following change be made to the constitution regarding absentee ballot voting. The change is proposed to help clarify the wording of absentee ballot voting.

#### **Current Wording**

- A6.05 Voting by proxy shall not be permitted for any matter. Voting by absentee ballot shall be permitted under the following conditions:
  - a. The member is out of the state of Minnesota at the time of the congregational meeting.
  - b. The member shall notify the Ministry Board of their reason for missing the congregational meeting and their desire to receive an absentee ballot.
  - c. The member shall submit their sealed ballot to the congregational President prior to the congregational meeting. The sealed ballot shall be opened and counted with all other ballots during the congregational meeting.
  - d. Absentee ballots can only cover elections and ratifications that cannot change during a course of a meeting.

#### **Proposed Wording Change**

to be voted on at the January 28, 2024 Annual Meeting

- A6.05 Voting by proxy shall not be permitted for any matter. Voting by absentee ballot shall be permitted under the following conditions A OR B.
  - a. The member, in good standing, is out of the state of Minnesota at the time of the congregational meeting.
  - b. The member must notify the Ministry Board at their regular meeting prior to the congregation meeting of their reason for wanting an absentee ballot. The Ministry Board will either approve or deny the request.
- A6.06 Absentee Ballot Return
  - a. Submit the approved and sealed Absentee Ballot at least four (4) days prior to the meeting to the church office during regular office hours. The sealed ballot shall be opened and counted with the ballots during the congregational meeting.
  - b. Absentee ballots can only cover elections and ratifications that cannot change during the congregational meeting.

For our 5<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade kids we are now offering Youth Group on Sundays after worship to accommodate busy schedules while still serving our kids with valuable Lutheran lessons.

Many have probably noticed that we no longer all fit in the large classroom and have had to expand to the sanctuary. We moved the youth group to the large classroom, preschool to the old youth group room, and the rest of our Sunday school classes into the sanctuary. This has worked well since all the classes are learning the same lessons so if attendance is small or if we need to combine for other reasons, we will all be studying the same thing. This also works well for the music portion and practicing with JoAnn. We believe as a committee that there is very little as important as having our youth strong in their faith. That comes with a solid curriculum, as well as a wonderful group of dedicated teachers. We are always open to ideas and encourage anyone who is interested in teaching or subbing to please reach out. We would love to put you into the rotation of this very rewarding program.

#### VBS:

The 2023 VBS theme was called Twists and Turns. Twists & Turns was a fantastical celebration of games of all kinds. From classic tabletop games to video games and more, kids played their way through VBS while learning that Jesus guides them through all the twists and turns of their lives. This is where imagination kicked creativity into high gear. The Bible Verse that was the centerpiece of the week was Psalm 25:4 "Make Your ways known to me, Lord; teach me your paths." This was a great week with lots of games, fun snacks and learning. We had many adult and youth volunteers, and we were blessed with 50 kids in attendance, which is lower than our prior years' attendance. We were competing with many camps and community kids events that week.

#### **NOISY OFFERING:**

Noisy Offering is collected during worship after JAM on the second Sunday of the month. These funds are used to assist congregations, families or areas impacted by disasters or tragedies. The beginning of this year we chose to direct funds to Operation Christmas Child, the Royals Room and the hurricane victims in Florida. We are always open to ideas on where to donate funds. Talk to a Christian Ed member with your idea. We want kids to learn the value of being generous and helping others in need.

#### **CONFIRMATION:**

The confirmation program is stronger than it has ever been. Every year we are amazed at the growth and remind ourselves of the early class sizes of Peace's confirmation days. It's truly amazing to see how the numbers have grown. We currently have 38 registered students in the confirmation program (1 - 10<sup>th</sup> graders, 11- 9<sup>th</sup> graders, 15- 8<sup>th</sup> graders, and 11- 7<sup>th</sup> graders). Our confirmation students meet at 6:15 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. This enables them to participate in youth group that evening as well.

Pastor David and Mark have done an amazing job with the confirmation program and have successfully created Peace's very own confirmation curriculum. The program is designed to present the core of the Christian and Lutheran faith through the study of scriptures and Luther's Small Catechism. We use these texts as the context for exploring current issues in the confirmands' lives. Pastor and Mark work to put material into students' hands and to create something that can be reused for years to come. This year's focus is the New Testament and why it's an important piece in a Lutheran's faith walk.

Teachers this year include Colette Thorson, Jon Peterson, Mark Nissen, Pastor Hanson, Nicole Johnsrud, Jessica Bogema-Baumann, Andrea Plahn and Josh Sommer.

#### **ADULT EDUCATION:**

There were some wonderful opportunities for adults to partake in education throughout the year at Peace. There was a great study offered during Lent and another in the Fall for both men and women.

The last Saturday of October was when the IF: Gathering was brought for a fourth time to Peace Lutheran. This women's gathering had 48 registrants. This is a wonderful experience for the women of Peace as well as the community to build and grow in their faith.

Looking ahead to 2024, we are proposing a balanced budget. This includes increased expenses of 6-7%, which is very similar to our membership growth rate. We are also projecting an increase in giving by 6-7% which is supported by an increase in the year's Faith Promises. # Highlights of 2023

In addition to monetary gifting decisions, the Missions team organized several opportunities for PLC members to volunteer and to serve those in need. Some of the organizations supported were local, while others were national and/or international (see the *Supported Mission in 2023* table for Mission specifics).

Our more notable activities for the year were as follows:

#### January 28 - Missions Service Work Day

Sewing machines, sergers and 19

workers (14 adults and 5 youth) gifted 99 3/4 hours of service. We assembled and tied two full-size quilts (graduating senior gifts), ripped and rolled white cotton sheets into 191 medical bandages (GHM), tied four 48x60 fleece blankets (Vinland National Center, Loretto), serged/tied nine fleece/flannel receiving blankets (OGT), sewed five pillowcase dresses (OGT), and cut flannel and fleece for 11 additional receiving blankets (OGT).

#### August 12 - Welcome Neighbor Corn Feed "Stuff the Truck" Food Drive

"Stuff the Truck" yielded 412.4 pounds of non-perishable food and \$100 monetary donations, which were delivered to the Watertown Friends for Life Food Shelf.

#### September 24 - Missions Sunday

Our guest speakers were Andrea and Kirk Hinnichs from Hosanna Lutheran Church in Lakeville, MN. They addressed having Servant Hearts and the "HEART" Ministry at Hosanna. PLC Missions volunteer activities for the year were highlighted with a video and bulletin insert. The Missions team also served as greeters and provided special music for the service.

#### **October 11 - Confirmation Servant** Night






